




On a final note, we thank him for his hard work and dedication to the St. Francis College community.














Twenty Five Years For Women


For the first women on these pages, perhaps it was not easy. For women today, perhaps it still is not easy. But certainly easier.



I sometimes feel that I should have absorbed more and taken more advantage of his genius. David was my friend and a friend to all, both students and faculty. He had a humor that was both bizarre and clever. I remember days that I would go to work (Academic Support Center) feeling frustrated and maybe sad but there he would be. He always knew what to say to make you laugh, just by cracking a joke and laughing his funny laugh. David, the tall, balding, skinny man with glasses.

I dedicate this book to him, as we all do at the *Franciscan* because of the affect he had on so many. He introduced students to many wonderful subjects and could discuss any issue with the right combination of seriousness and humor.

David was my encyclopedia for learning about film, musicals, theater, history of all kinds and specifically about Willa Cather and the comical genius of Betty Comden and Adolph Green. I remember he once said, jokingly "Comden and Green are such hams, they belong in a deli freezer."

He would spend hours talking to me (and other students) about these subjects and about life. He would talk to you and pull out dozens of books with pictures and stories, animating his tales. He would share about his life, his hometown Erie, Pennsylvania and his sisters and brother. A final memory is of the famous candy dish, filled with an assortment of delicious candies for everyone and anyone to take.

So we humbly give this to the Candyman, David Pfister, thank you for giving your knowledge and yourself to the St. Francis College community and doing it so wonderfully. We love you.






Montage


The Voice

The Model United Nations Club promotes international cooperation and cohesiveness in order to achieve international peace and understanding.






Rho Sigma Phi

n July 25, U.S. President Bill Clinton welcomes King Hussein of Jordan, right, and Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin to the White House, where the two sign a historic nonaggression pact that ends a 46-year state of belligerency between Israel and Jordan. J oyful residents of Belfast celebrate after the Irish Republican Army (IRA) announces an end to its military operations in Northern Ireland as of August 31. After 25 years of British military presence and over 3,000 killings, the IRA says it will now seek Irish union only through political channels.



When their Army helicopter accidentally strays into North Korea in December, Chief Warrant Officers Bobby Wayne Hall and David Hilemon are shot down by the communists. Washington does not admit to espionage as the North Koreans want, but negotiates for survivor Bobby Hall's release by expressing its sincere regret over the intrusion.



> ormer football star **O.J. Simpson is** charged with the June 12th stabbing death of his ex-wife Nicole and her friend Ronald Goldman, causing a non-stop media avalanche. The sensational case familiarized watchers with spouse abuse, a televised ride in a white Ford Bronco, "Kato" Kaelin, and DNA testing. Simpson faces the jury in January.





The Secret Service considers restricting public access to the White House after a gunman fires 27 rounds at the building's facade in October. In September, a small Cessna airplane crashes on the South Lawn and comes to rest at the base of the White House below President Clinton's bedroom, killing the pilot.



The U.S. Interior Department moves the bald eagle from its endangered species list to the less critical "threatened" category. The Pacific Northwest's spotted owl is left to fend for itself when in June a federal judge lifts the 1991 injunction that halted logging in the owl's habitat.

The fossil of a previously unknown dinosaur, the 25-footlong Cryolophosaurus ellioti, is found in Antarctica.



The new readable labels provide realistic serving sizes, list calories from fat, and allow you to compare different nutrient values. A utostereograms, popularly known as Magic Eye, cause legions of people to stare cross-eyed for long periods of time. Based on a mystery of neurology and 3-D objects, pattern elements fuse into left-eye and right-eye images of a single hidden object which appears to be floating.

The ship, overused and in poor condition, was ripped apart by 90-mph winds and 30-foot waves. Most of the 29 crewmen are entombed inside the wreckage, well preserved in the 39° waters.
