

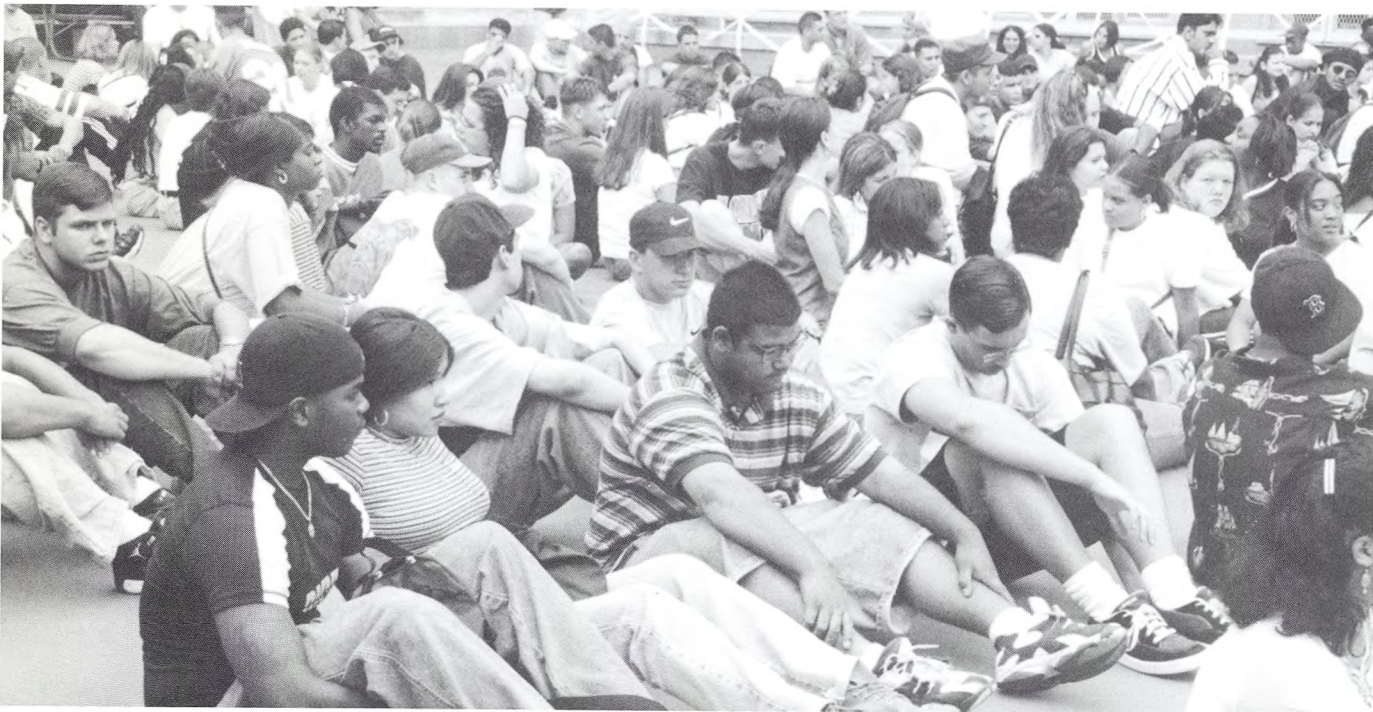


The Franciscan Heritage



On May 8th St. Francis College established a Literary College in the City of Brooklyn based on the spirit of St. Francis of Assisi.

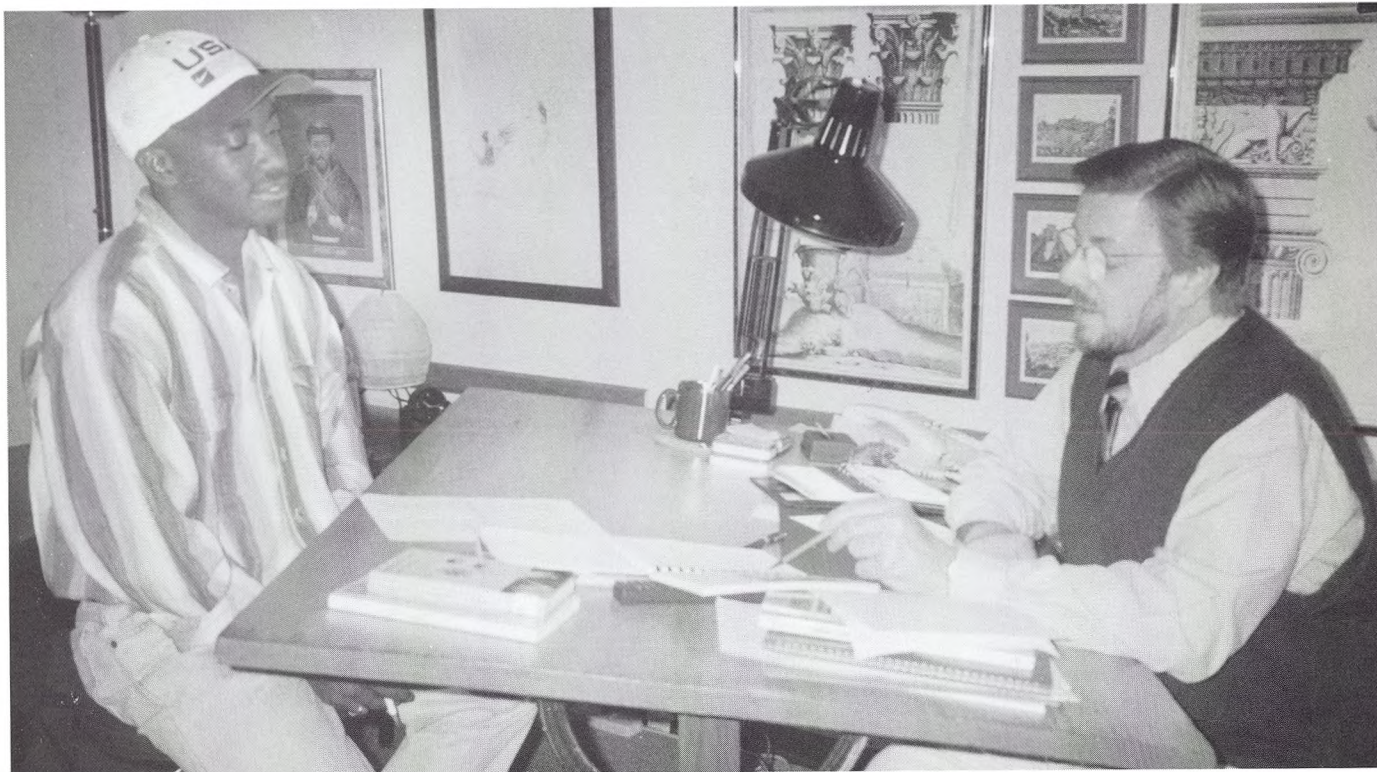
St. Francis College is located on 180 Remsen Street, between Court Street and Clinton Street.

Our multi-racial campus is exemplified by the 45 countries that are represented in the student body attending St. Francis College.

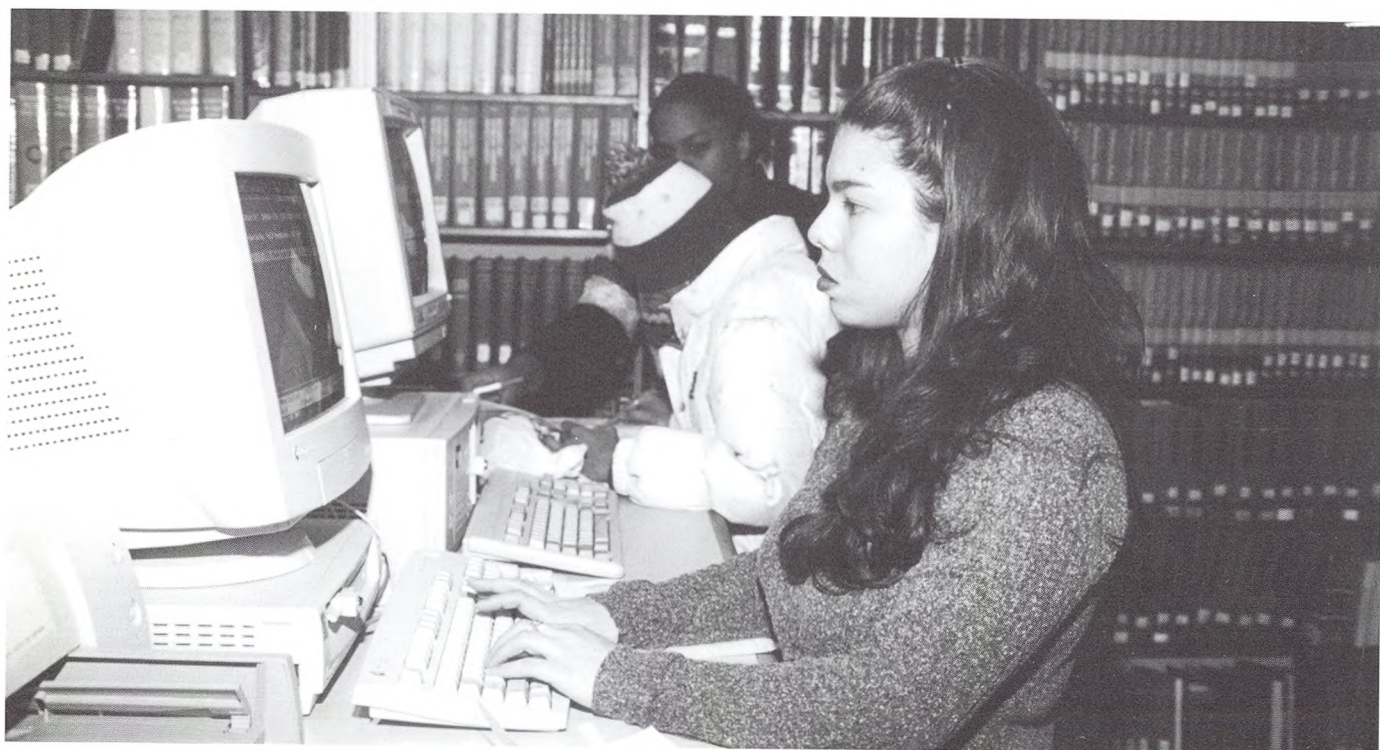

The Game Room offers a wide variety of games from, Mortal Combat, Pac-Man to Pinball for the students to enjoy during the day.

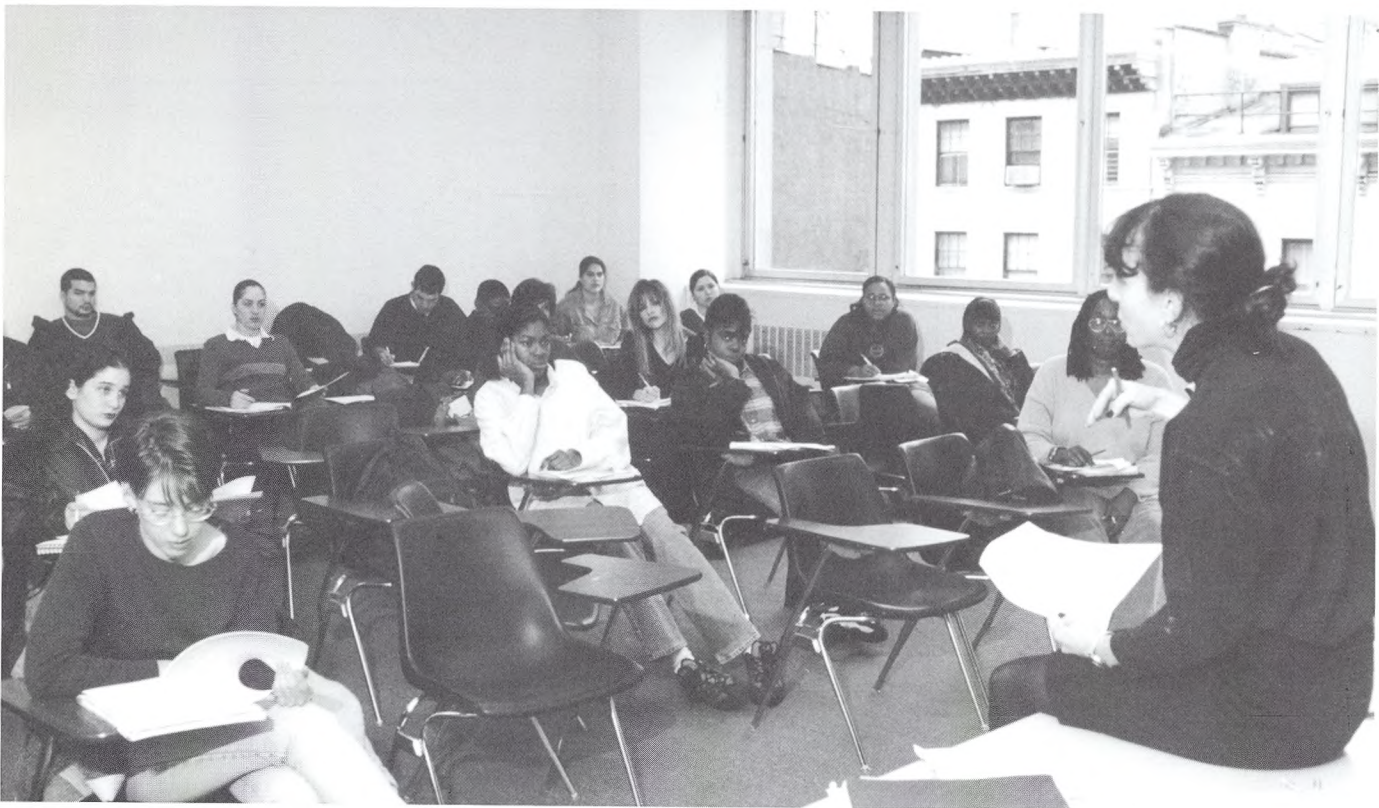

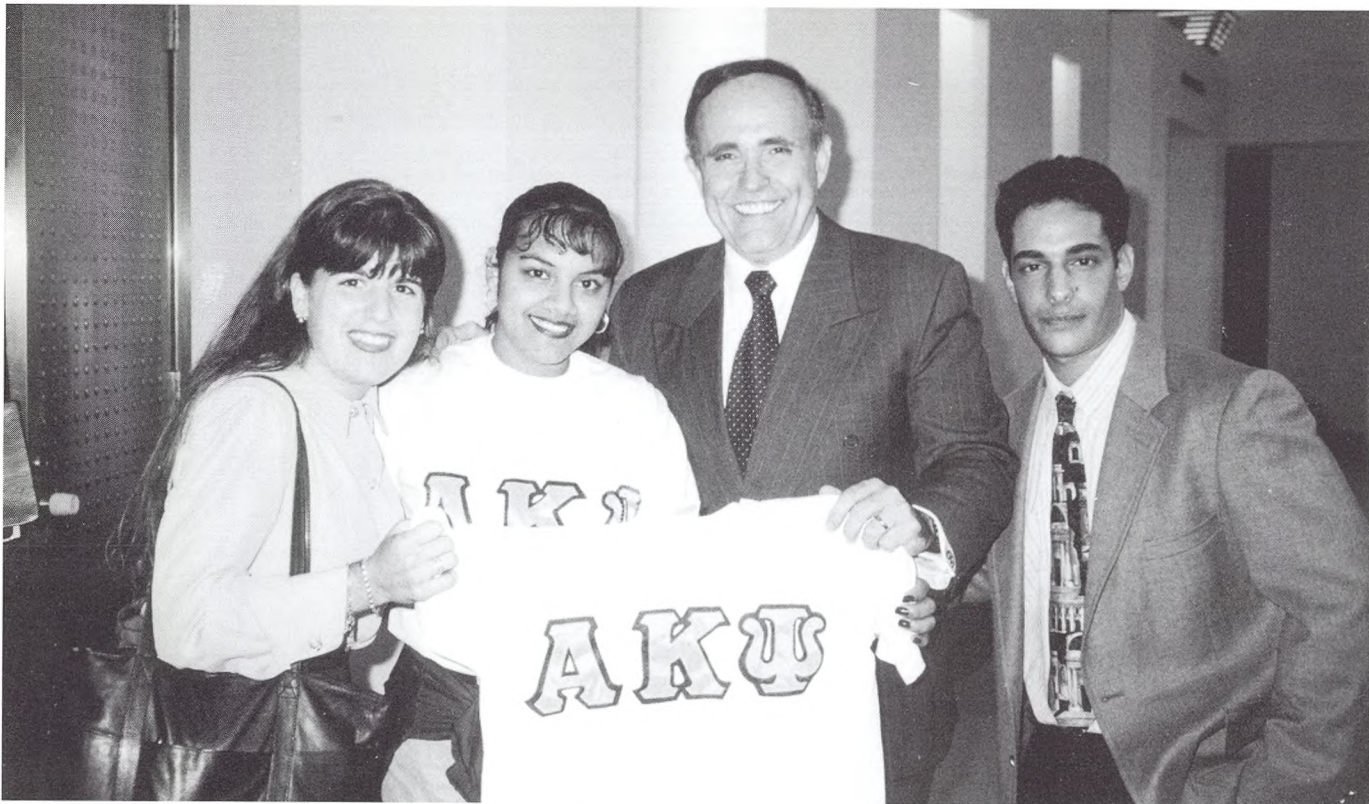

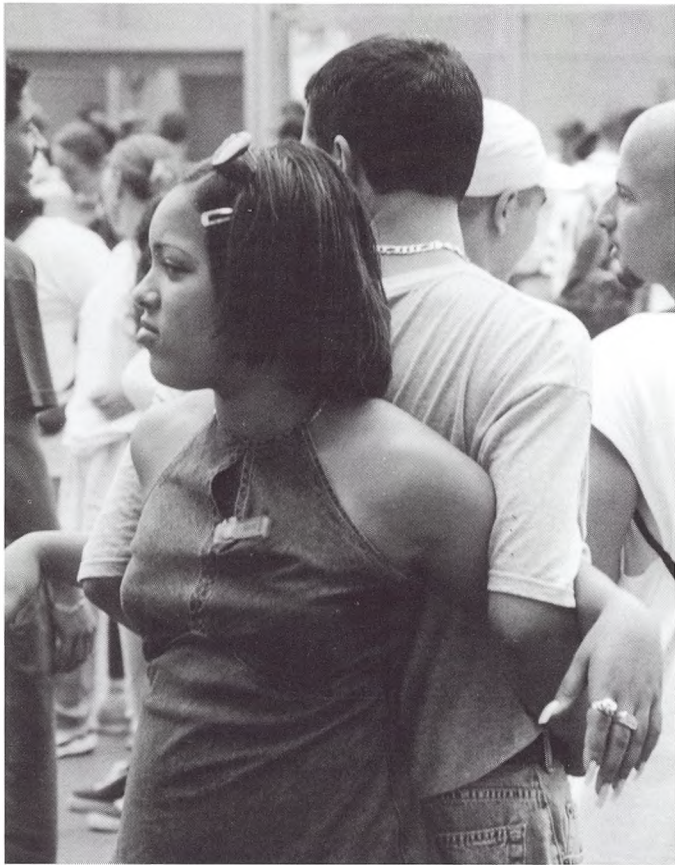

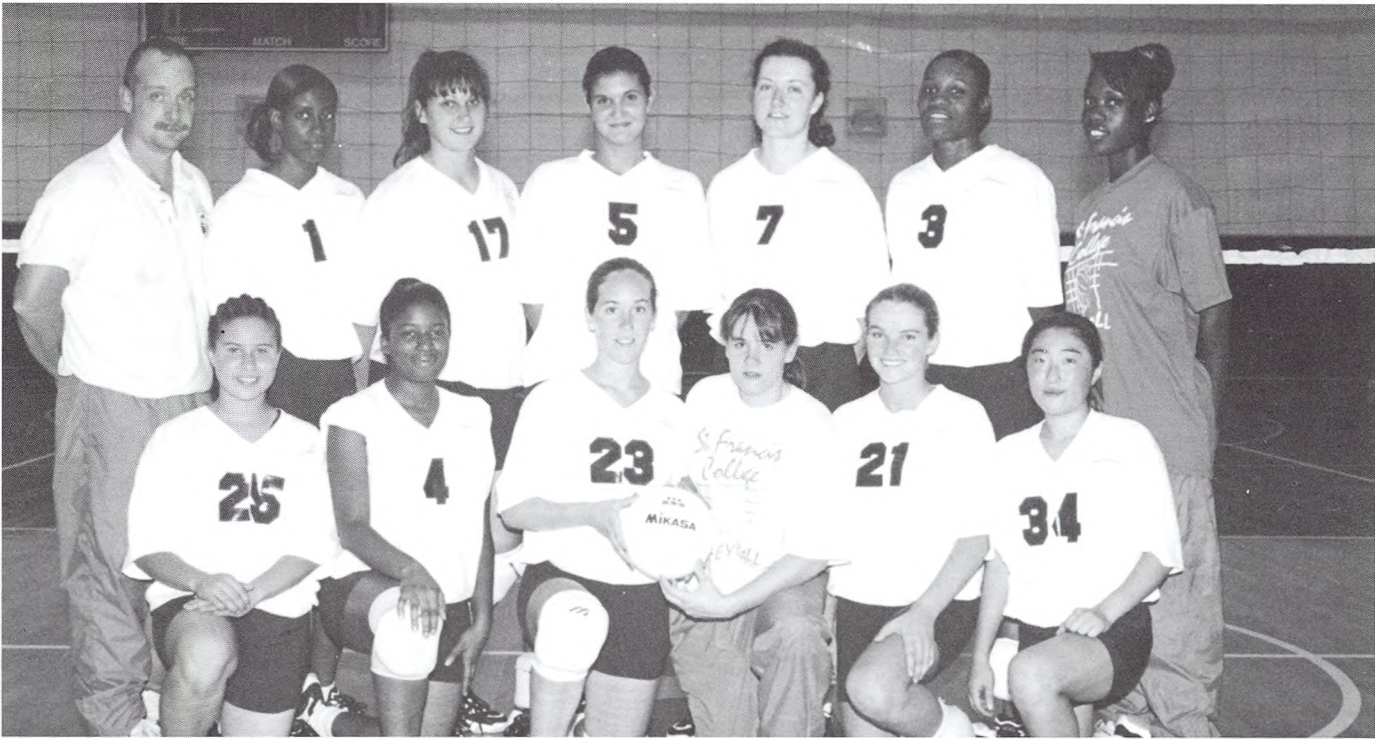

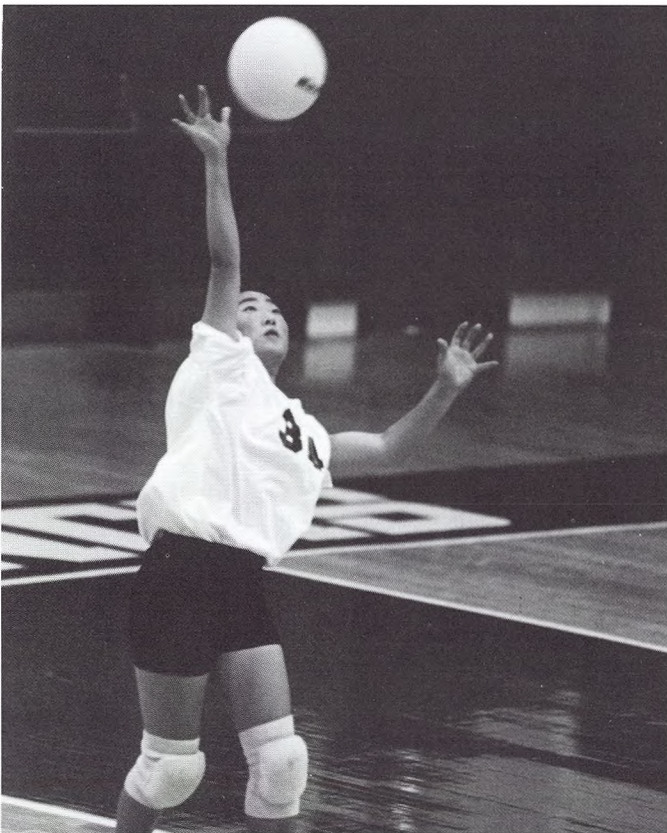

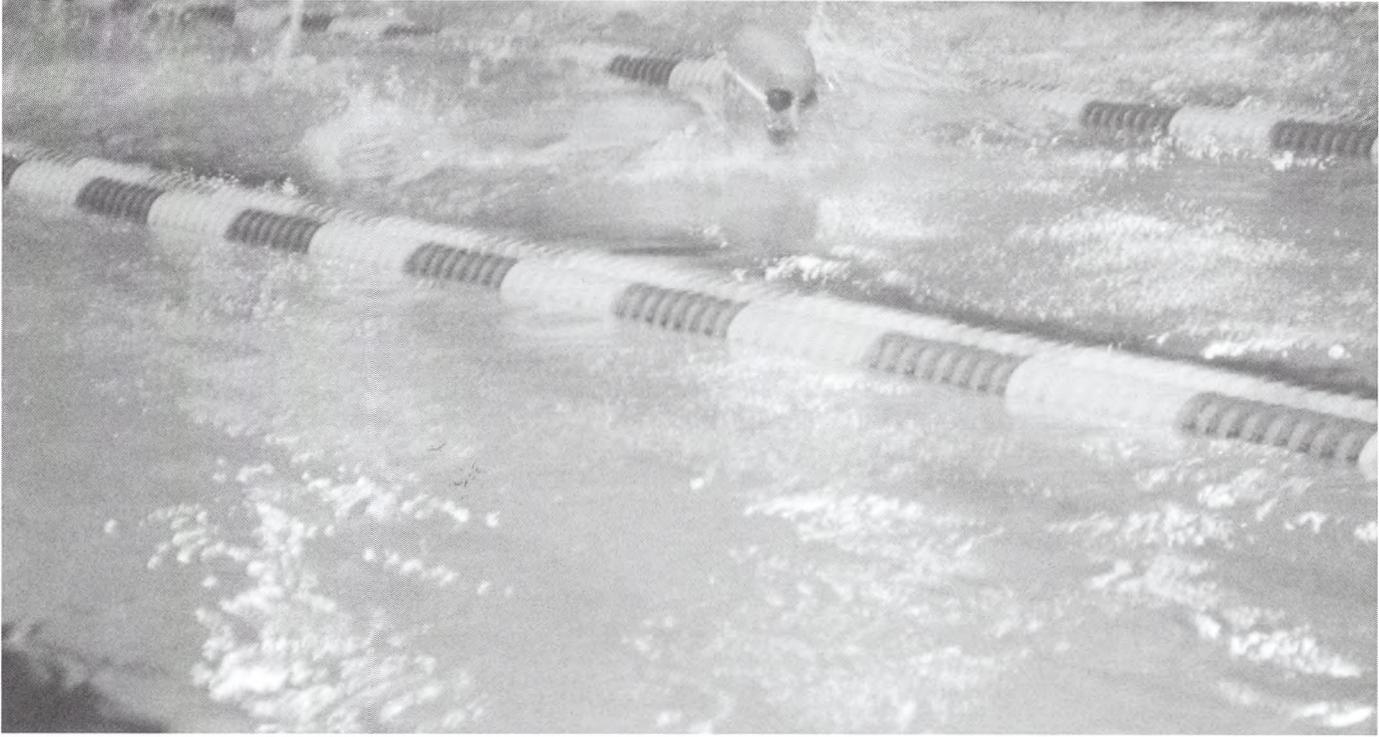

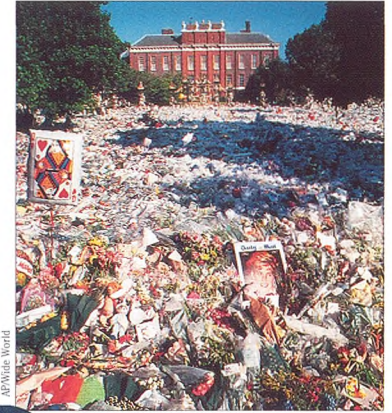

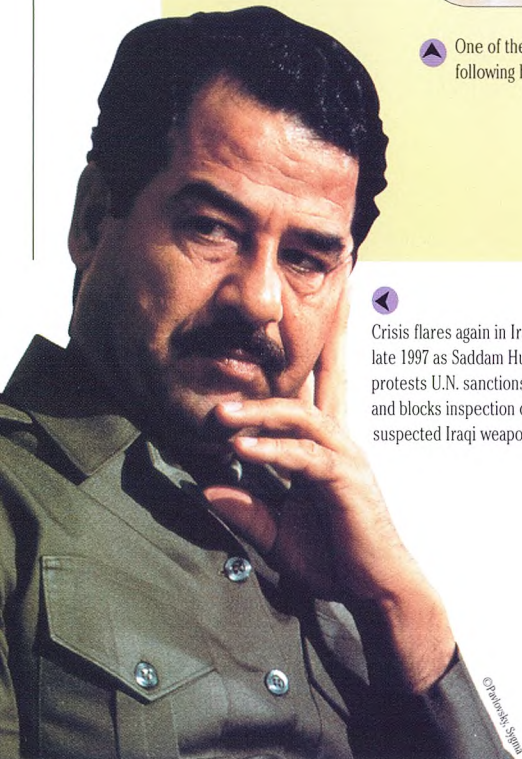

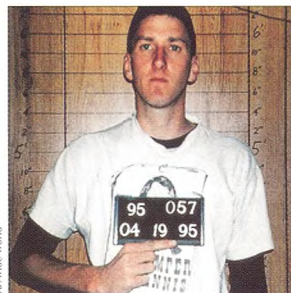

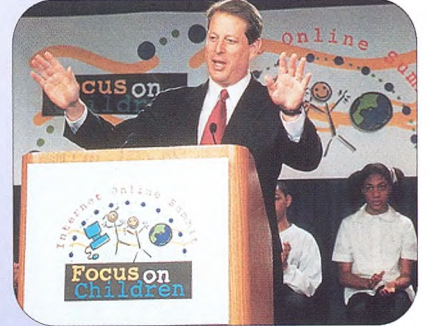

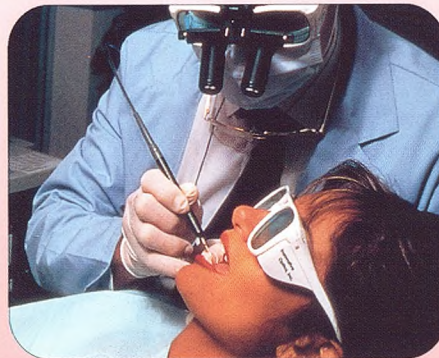

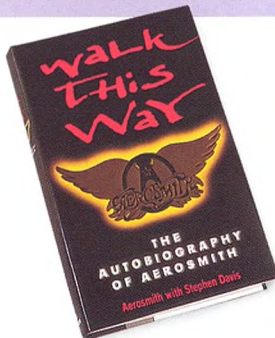

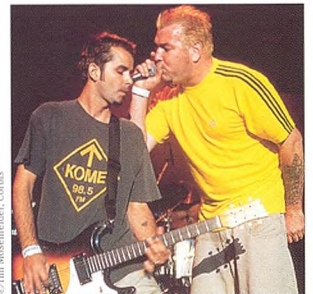

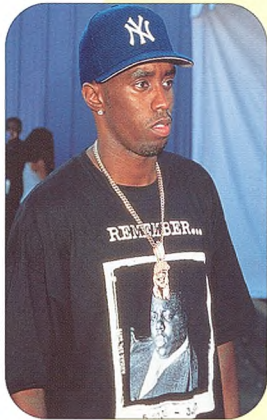

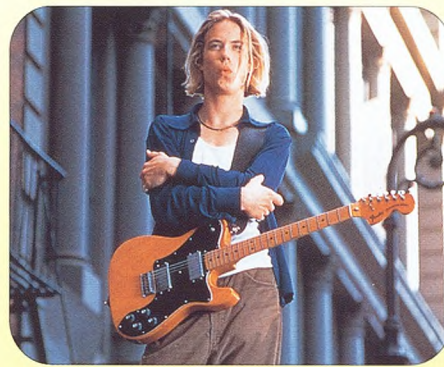

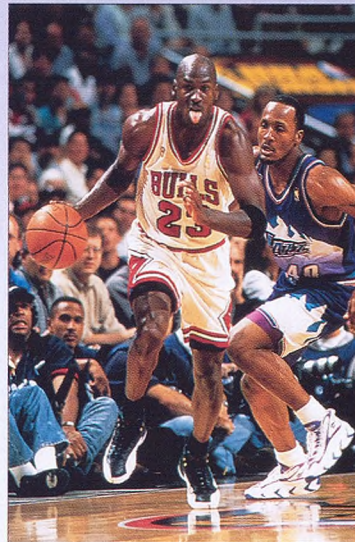

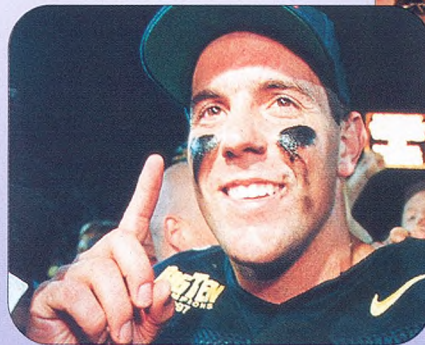

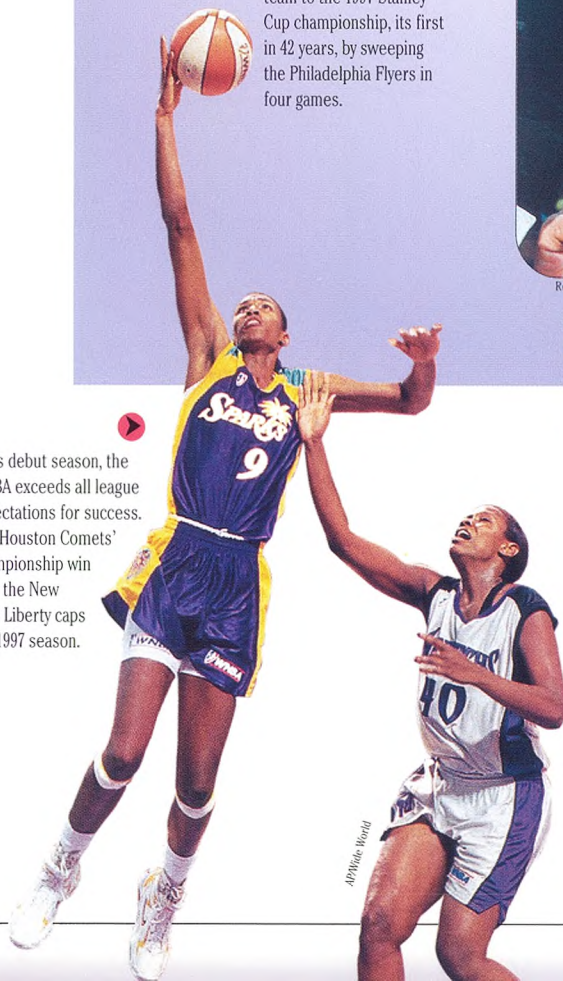

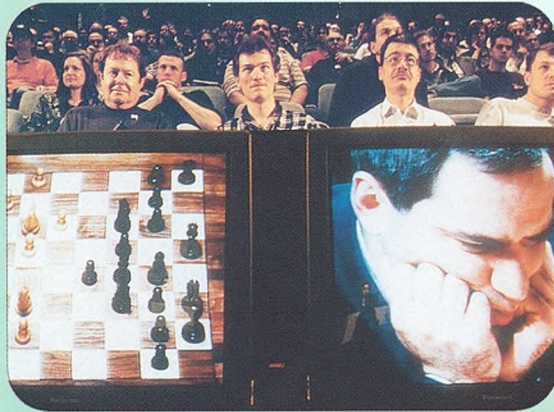

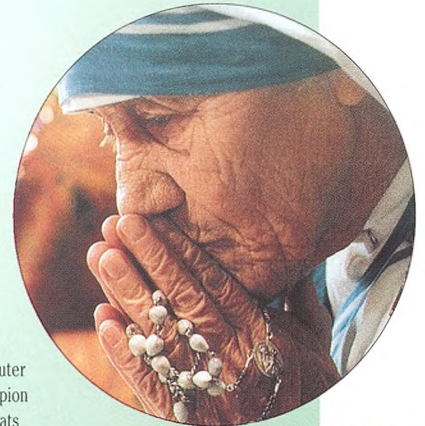
