
### The Franciscan Heritage



On May 8th St. Francis College established a Literary College in the City of Brooklyn based on the spirit of St. Francis of Assisi.




St. Francis College is located on  $180\,\rm Remsen$  Street, between Court Street and Clinton Street.



St. Francis welcomed the Class of 2001, 467 freshman joined the college this past year.





The Regents Lounge is a place where students could socialize and hang out during the day.








