he following pages are dedicated to the professors leaving St. Francis College. Dr. Ann Amore has been appointed President of Rosemont College, Pennsylvania. Dr. Nino Langiulli and Dr. Timothy Quigley have retired from St. Francis College after more than 35 years of service.

Ann Amore, Ph.D.

Dr. Ann Amore has been the Vice-President of College Relations and Special Events for the past 22 years. Recently, Dr. Amore has been appointed President of Rosemont College, Pennsylvania. Those who have worked with her or have had the honor of being taught by her know how much St. Francis loses with her departure.

President Macchiarola states: "Dr. Ann Amore is a dynamic and brilliant educator and administrator. Rosemont College has chosen wisely and I know she will serve with distinction. We are truly sad to lose her, but filled with great joy over her new challenge." When he learned about the appointment, Dr.

Macchiarola said that he "was elated for her but sad for us."

Dr. Ann Amore has obtained her Bachelors of



Arts and Master of Arts in English at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, in 1969, and 1976 respectively, and her Ph.D. in English at New York University, in 1996. In addition to being Vice-President of College Relations, Dr. Amore has been an adjunct associate professor of English at St. Francis since 1997. Dr. Amore has instilled in her students the love for reading the work of great writers such as Henry James, Edith Wharton and James Joyce. As she used to say, understanding a novel is above all understanding oneself, because each of us offer a personalized view of what the writer might have thought. In her literature classes not only have we learned about outstanding pieces of work, but we also learned about ourselves. Her brilliance, energy and dedication to us, her students, have determined us time and again to register for her courses.

As Vice-President, Dr. Amore has coordinated major fund raising campaigns for: the establishment of an endowed scholarship program at St. Francis College which now funds 81 scholarships; the expansion of the College's McGarry Library; the renovation and establishment of the McArdle Student Center; the renovation of the College's Auditorium and the creation of the Callahan Conference Center. Also she has organized and supervised the year-long St. Francis College Centennial Celebration, revamped and improved the College's publications and marketing strategy resulting in increased enrollment, as well as increased Alumni Annual Giving to the College. She has initiated a comprehensive and well-received program of community events which has drawn visitors of all ages to St. Francis College.

One of the achievements Dr. Amore is most proud of is the establishment of a permanent endowed scholarship in the memory of her mother, The Anne Longo-Amore Scholarship, in amount of \$75,000, which will allow a deserving student to attend St. Francis College tuition free every year. Dr. Amore's parents always knew the importance of being educated. They encouraged and supported her to complete her education.

Dr. Amore has been appointed Honorary Member of Duns Scotus Honor Society, and this year she has been offered The Honorary Degree of Doctor of Humane Letters for her extraordinary contribution to St. Francis College.

Learning about the departure of Dr. Amore, members of administration started a scholarship in her name. For those who have worked with her, or who have been her students, Dr. Ann Amore is irreplaceable. She has constantly filled our lives with joy, and we all have come to admire her modesty and her great elegance in simplicity.

Nino Langiulli, Ph. D.

Dr. Nino Langiulli retired after 41 years of teaching at St. Francis College. He started as instructor in Theology in 1961 and has taught Philosophy since 1965. Dr. Langiulli's retirement brought much sadness to his students and to members of faculty and administration equally. As one of his students in my freshman year, I found Philosophy 101 extremely challenging and gratifying. Dr. Langiulli pushed his students to their limits, and thanks to his determination to make them "go the distance," as he used to say, his students obtained not only fundamental knowledge of philosophy, but also subtlety of thought and reason.

Dr. Langiulli has always expected diligence and hard work of his students because he himself has been an industrious student. He obtained his B.A. in Philosophy at Maryknoll College in 1955, then the M.A. in Theology at Maryknoll Seminary in 1957, M.A. in English at Hunter College of the C.U.N.Y. in1960, M.A. at the University of Turin, Italy in 1961, and M.A. in Philosophy at New York University in 1965. In 1973, Nino Langiulli obtained his Ph.D. in Philosophy at New York University.

Dr. Langiulli received many awards and honors for his great teaching and leadership skills. In 1991, Dr.

Langiulli was presented with the Sears Roebuck Competi-

tive Teaching Excellence and Campus Leadership award. He received the Pax et Bonum Medal for 15 and 25 years of service at St. Francis College. In 1980 he was elected by the Honor Students to the Duns Scotus Honor Society. He also received the Franciscan Spirit Award given by Student Government Association. In 1966, Dr. Langiulli was nominated to the Danforth Associates for Excellence in teaching and commitment to its Personal Dimension. In 1960, Fulbright and the Italian government gave Nino Langiulli a grant to study Contemporary European Philosophy in Turin.

Dr. Langiulli published a series of books and articles, reviews and translations throughout his career. He was the editor of <u>European Existentialism</u> (1997), <u>The Existentialist Tradition</u> (1971), and in 1992 he published <u>Possibility</u>, <u>Necessity and Existence</u>. From 1989 until 1996, he was the associate editor of <u>Measure</u>, a journal dedicated to academic freedom and integrity.

At St. Francis College, Dr. Langiulli taught Basic problems in Philosophy, Logic or Reasoning and Argumentation, Theories of Human Nature, Theories of Knowledge, Moral Philosophy, Political Philosophy, Metaphysics, Existentialism, Medieval Philosophy, Contemporary Philosophy, Philosophy of Law.

His students have learned valuable lessons about themselves. Dr. Langiulli challenged them spiritually and intellectually, tested their abilities to understand the world, while understanding great ideas and great philosophers. Exceptional men are hard to encounter. His students and those who worked with him feel honored and blessed to have had him as professor, and friend. He taught them respect for life and integrity, values he carries with himself.


An endowed scholarship in his name has been started at St. Francis College, and the first to receive in 2000 was Philosophy student Andrew Fisher. The scholarship will carry on Dr. Langiulli's name and will remind St. Francis College of how great a professor and a man he is.



Eimothy Quigley, Ph.D

Dr. Thomas Quigley retired after 37 years of teaching at St. Francis College. He has taught Chemistry at the College since 1964. Dr. Quigley has obtained his B.S. in Chemistry at St. Francis College in 1952. In 1959, he completed the M.S. in Physical Chemistry at Brooklyn College, where he was teacher assistant and conducted research. In 1964 he received his Ph.D. in Physical Chemistry and Analytical Chemistry at Rutgers University, New Jersey, where he also was instructor.

Dr. Quigley's dedication to teaching and to his students has been recognized and rewarded throughout his career. In 1974, he was inducted as honorary member of Alpha Xi Chapter of Chi Beta Phi National Science Honor Society. He received the Pax et Bonum Medal for 15 and 25 years of teaching at St. Francis College. Dr. Quigley was offered the New York Section of the American Chemical Society's Achievement Award. In 1988, he received the Space Science Students Involvement Program Certificate from NASA and the National Science Teachers Association. Student Government Association declared Dr. Quigley the Faculty of the Year, and in 1993 he received the Alumni Association Distinguished



Faculty Award. Same year he was given the L.I.U. Presidential Award for work with high school teachers. This year, Dr. Quigley received the St. Francis College Administrator of the Year Award from the Athletics Department.

As a faculty member, Dr. Quigley dedicated much of his time to a series of committees. He was chairman of the Academic Standards Committee, the Athletic Policy Committee, the Nominating Committee. He also was the Chairman of the Scholarship and Grants in Aids Committee, which became the Financial Aid and Scholarship Committee.

Dr. Thomas Quigley was moderator of the Duns Scotus Honors Society and the Ice Hockey Club. He participated in many activities involving students beyond his teaching at the College. Dr. Quigley was member of the Alumni Association Board of Directors and chairman of Red and Blue Committee of Alumni Board.

Outside the College, Dr. Quigley was member of the American Chemical Society (ACS), the Education Committee of the New York Section ACS, and member of the Membership Committee of the New York Section ACS. Dr. Quigley became the chairman of the Brooklyn Subsection of the New York Section ACS, and member of the Sigma Xi Science Society.

At St. Francis College, Dr. Quigley taught General Chemistry I and II, Analytic Chemistry, Instrumental Analysis, Physical Chemistry I and II, Biochemistry and Chemistry and Life.

Dr. Thomas Quigley is described by his students as demanding but fair. He expected much hard work and dedication from them, and, in order to get an excellent grade, "he gives you a run for your money" (Elise Francis, student). He was a challenging professor who gave more than he expected to receive. When asked one question, he would explain it with much patience and detail. Beyond his being a tough and demanding professor, his students always found a soft-talking, understanding and helpful friend. His goal was to provide his students with quality, long-lasting knowledge in Chemistry, difficult science which requires, above all, hard work and love for the subject. As he used to be chairman of the Chemistry and Mathematics Department, he insisted on his students using the "handy-dandy calculator," as one student remembers being his favorite phrase.

His students and the faculty and administration members expressed their regret at Dr. Quigley's retirement. He will be missed! Dedication Pages by Gina Sandu








Commencement

The Haitian Alliance welcomes anyone who wants to know Haitian American history, culture, music, and dance. We promote unity, leadership, and service.



Intercollegiate Athletics

The greatest sports stories are often those told about the underdog team that, lacking fancy uniforms and equipment, gets inspired by a fiery pep talk from a devoted coach and goes out and soundly trounces the opposition. Stories like this can be told time and time again in the history of sports at St. Francis. When there were little more than 100 students attending the college in the midst of the Great Depression, the basketball team alone racked up victory after victory against teams ten times its size. Then there was the time the swim team swept all first honors in a meet held at a borrowed pool. The football players had similar success without benefit of a home field.

Many outstanding "firsts" were chronicled in the sports pages of the college. St. Francis was the first college in the city of New York to sponsor a basketball team and the first Catholic college in the nation to start a lacrosse team. The school had integrated athletic teams several years before Jackie Robinson broke the racial barrier in professional sports. The first women's team quickly matched the successes of men, and, in fact, the leading all-time basketball scorer at St. Francis was a woman.

Perhaps St. Francis' teams are considered regional and even local by today's standards. Yet, several of them have participated in national tournaments, and have even seized first-place victories. Some of the more talented athletes have been drafted by professional teams and invited to the Olympic trials. When college basketball was in its heyday, thousands of fans filled Madison Square Garden to cheer the St. Francis team. One of the key ingredients for success in sports at SFC has been the ability to change with the times, to infuse vitality into athletic endeavors, and to persevere in the face of overwhelming odds.

In an address to the Alumni Association in November, 1961, Most Rev. Dominic Coscia, O.F.M., Bishop of Jatai, Brazil, summed up the spirit that has always enabled St. Francis to compete successfully:

Franciscan spirit does not depend on the size of the school. It is something deeper, which is acquired from the friars. This school has always been a struggling man's college. The struggles the student has to undergo and the hardships he has to endure give him a better appreciation of the education he receives.

In no other area of college life was this more evident than in athletic competition. The St. Francis teams competed against schools with more money, better facilities, and bigger drawing power. Yet they still triumphed more often than not.

Men's Basketball

en's basketball team made history this past season. The Terriers captured their first-ever regular-season Northeast Conference championship, and advanced to

the NEC Championship Game for the first time ever. As a result, St. Francis appeared on national television (ESPN2) for the first time in school history. The Terriers' run to an NCAA tournament berth fell just short, however, as St. Francis lost to Monmouth University in the final game.

For the second consecutive season, St. Francis' roster sported a pair of First-Team All-NEC stars in seniors Richy Dominguez and Steven Howard. Howard was subsequently named a District II All-Star by the National Association of Basketball Coaches and was a First-Team All-Metropolitan selection by the Metropolitan Basketball Writers' Association. Dominguez was also honored by the Metropolitan Writers, as he was named to the Third Team.

However, the 2000-2001 Terriers were far from a two-player team. Senior point guard Greg Nunn capped off an exceptional career as St. Francis' all-time leader in both assists and steals. Senior Heberth Reyes ranks second in career blocked shots after another fine season, and junior Clifford Strong made an immediate impact on the Terriers' fortunes when he joined the team at mid-season. Beyond the starting five, every member of the Terriers contributed to the team's success in some way during the season.


omen's basketball was a talented squad, but featured a roster with eight new players. The team showed its inexperience in the final record, but prospects for the future are very bright.

dding to a tradition of excellence, men's water polo team finished the season with a best-ever 34-3 final record, and put together a 23-game winning streak. For the second consecutive year, St. Francis came within one game of advancing to the NCAA Men's Water Polo Championship, an event which includes only four teams. However, St. Francis' hopes of playing for the national title came to an end in the final minute of the third overtime period in the Collegiate Water Polo Association championship game against Navy.


For the second year in a row, the Terriers were undefeated in CWPA Northern Division regular-season play. In 2000, St. Francis won its first-ever Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Championship.

At the conclusion of the season, the honors came rolling in for the Terriers. Senior Roland

Manyai was selected as a Third-Team All-American, and was one of four finalists for the Peter J. Cutino Award, which is water polo's equivalent of football's Heisman Trophy or basketball's Naismith Award. Junior Ali Gozluk was chosen as an Honorable Mention All-American. Seniors Csaba Biro and Tamas Katona both earned All-Conference, All-ECAC, and All-CWPA Tournament honors.

In April, Katona was awarded an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship, becoming the firstever student-athlete from St. Francis College to earn such an award.

For the third consecutive year, the Terriers were ranked first in the national academic rankings of all NCAA Men's Water Polo teams. Terrier coach Carl Quigley has built a program which is strong in both classroom and in the competitive arena.


Men's Baseball

fter a one-year absence, the St. Francis College baseball team returned to the Northeast Conference Championships. The

Terriers completed the season with a 25-22 overall record, and a 14-8 mark in the Northeast Conference.

Junior Jason Fardella had a dominant season on the mound, posting a school-record eight wins and leading the staff in earned-run average (2.68) and strikeouts (86) for the second consecutive year. He was a three-time Northeast Conference Pitcher of the Week and the Northeast Conference Pitcher of the Year, and fashioned a 6-1 record against Northeast Conference competition. Junior Anthony DeNicola also had a fine season, going 4-4 with a 4.02 earned run average. The Terriers' offensive leader was freshman Mike Molinini, who completed his rookie season with a .388 batting average, 13 doubles, three triples, four home runs, and 15 stolen bases. Junior Jason Iorio strengthened the outfield while batting .323 and leading the team with 16 stolen bases.

St. Francis placed five players on the All-Northeast Conference teams. Fardella was a First-Team selection. The Second Team featured four Terriers: senior catcher Kasey Koslowski, sophomore designated hitter Anthony Esposito, freshman second baseman Anthony Giudice, and Michael Molinini.

which were hosted by Central Connecticut State University in October. Indoor track and field teams competed



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<u>Men's and Women's</u> Swimming

Men's swimming posted a 5-5 regularseason record, and finished a strong fecond at the Northeast Conference Invitational. Numerous school records were set throughout the season, as this

was the strongest team the Terriers have assembled in many years.

Freshman Erno Tekauer was the star of the team in the short freestyle events. Tekauer not only smashed the school record in the 50-yard freestyle, but he was also the Northeast Conference champion and the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) champion (St. Francis' first-ever individual ECAC champion).

Sophomore Shawn Pouchet was the Terriers' top breaststroke participant. Pouchet capped off his season with a first-place finish in the 100-yard breast at the Northeast Conference Invitational, and added a second-place finish in the 200-yard breast.

Sophomore Firat Cologlu and senior Filip Glowa were also consistently high scorers throughout the campaign.

With a 10-4 dual-meet record, the St. Francis College women's swimming team set a school record for victories. Illnesses prevented the team from placing higher at the Northeast Conference Championships, but that does not diminish the performance of the team throughout the season.

The Terriers were led by a trio of outstanding newcomers who were frequently triple-event winners. Freshman Catherine Dale dominated in the short freestyle events, setting school records throughout the season. Freshman Marina Shport and sophomore Danielle Timothy, the team's long-distance specialist, were also instrumental in the Terriers' victories.

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
Women's Volleyball

he St. Francis College women's volleyball team continued to climb the ladder in the Northeast Conference,

finishing the season with an 11-19 overall record and a 3-6 record in league play. The Terriers were seeking their first NEC playoff appearance since the league reduced the field to six teams, and entered the final match of the season with a chance to reach the tournament.

The Terriers received a boost from the arrival of freshman Brittany Daniel, who finished the season as the team's leader in kills, digs, and service aces. The coaches in the Northeast Conference took notice of Daniel's ability, as she was the only freshman to earn All-Northeast Conference honors when she was named to the Second Team. Men's Soccer

en's soccer team returned to the Northeast Conference playoffs after a one-year hiatus. The Terriers finished the season with a 10-6-1 overall record, and a 7-2-1 mark in Northeast Conference play, giving them a second-place finish. St. Francis closed the regular season with a three-game winning streak, which included a 1-0 shutout victory over the league's regular-season and tournament champion Fairleigh Dickinson University. The Terriers also played a competitive non-league schedule, which included a 3-1 victory over the University of Wisconsin, a recent national championship team, on September 8. The season came to a close with a 2-0 loss to nationally-ranked UMBC in the Northeast Conference semifinals.

At the close of the season, five Terriers were selected by the Northeast Conference's coaches as All-Conference selections. Seniors Agard Radoncic and Mersim Beskovic, as well as freshman goalkeeper Marcus Maurice, were First-Team All-NEC honorees, while junior Agron Sokolji and sophomore Prince Ogodo were both chosen to the All-NEC Second Team.







In the end junior Biology major Marlon Collins, and sophomore Mathematics major Deanna Phillippe emerged as Mr. and Miss St. Francis College 2000.








