

HUMANITIES CLUB

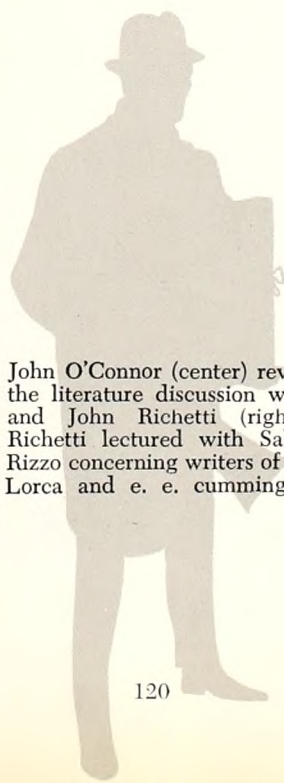

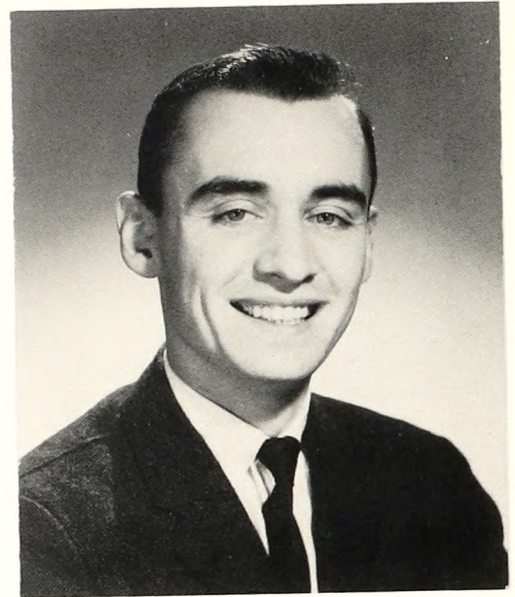

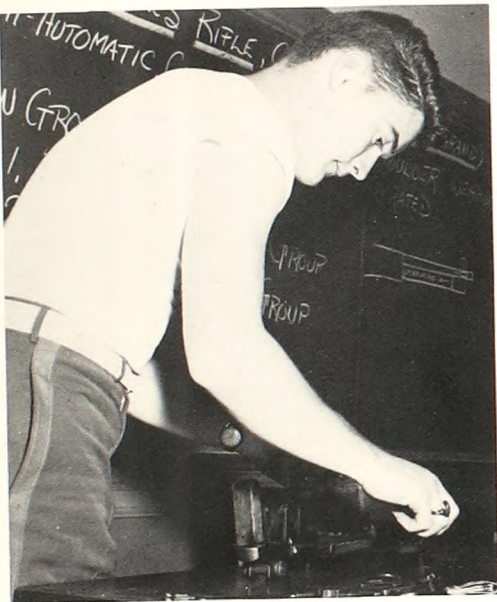
