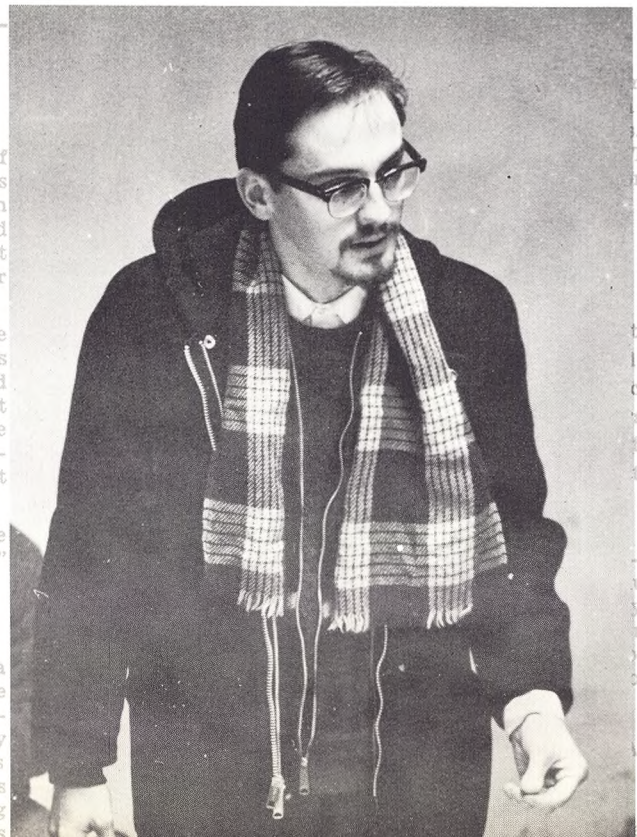
With the election of Pat Calhoun and the subsequent appointment of Bob Ford as Co-Editors, the Voice came into its own in '68.
