Troupers

Since its foundation, Saint Francis has had one type of theatrical group or other, except for short periods during World Wars I ad II. Known as the Saint Francis Literary Union at the turn of the century, they gave a successful presentation of Henry IV and the Merchant of Ghent. In 1925, the students adopted "The Troupers" as their official title, and made Adam and Eve their first production under the new name. In the years that followed, comedy and musical productions were the center of concentration. Student direction, which came into focus with The Rising of the Moon, was continued with the production of Death of a Salesman. In 1955, when Brother Giles, O.S.F. assumed direction, two major productions - The Hasty Heart and The Lady's Not For Burning were staged. Since then, productions of The Man Who Came to Dinner, My Three Angels, and Hope Is A Thing With Feathers have won the group wide acclaim.
