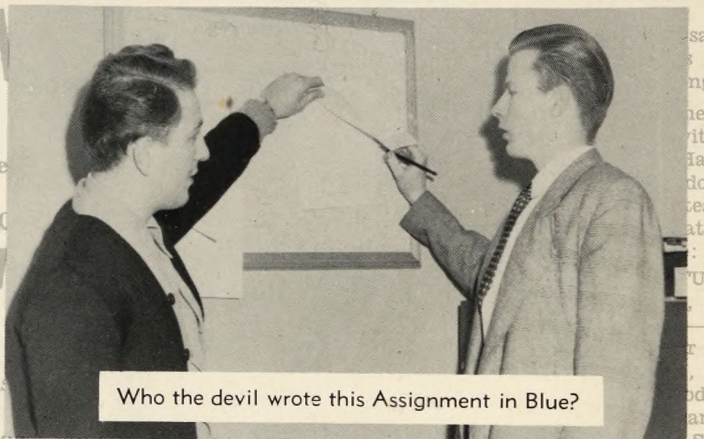

RC Dance At Colum

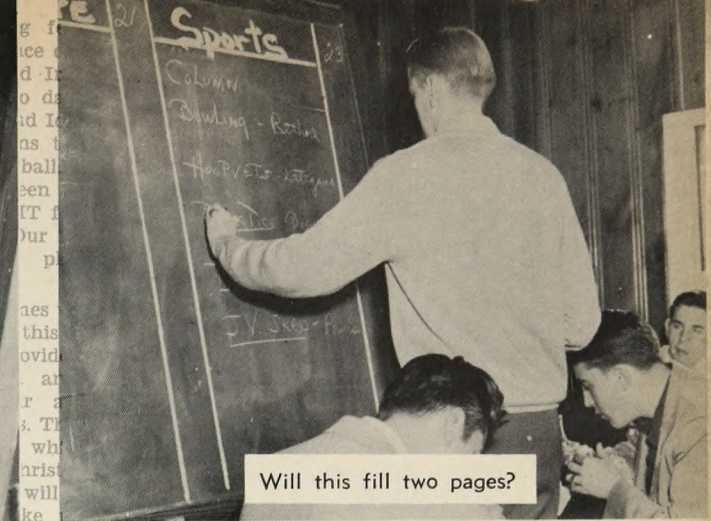

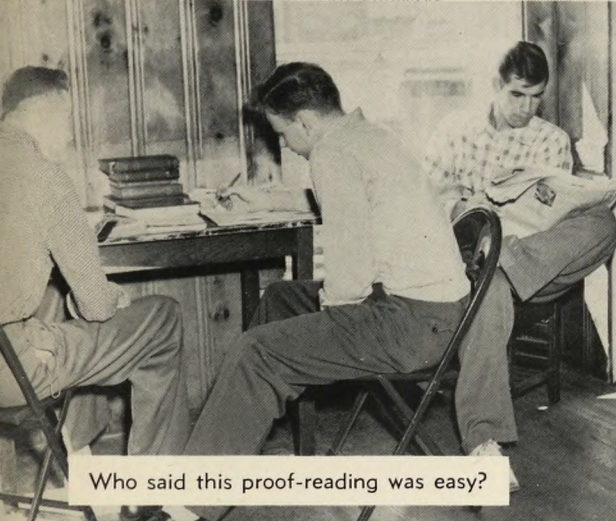

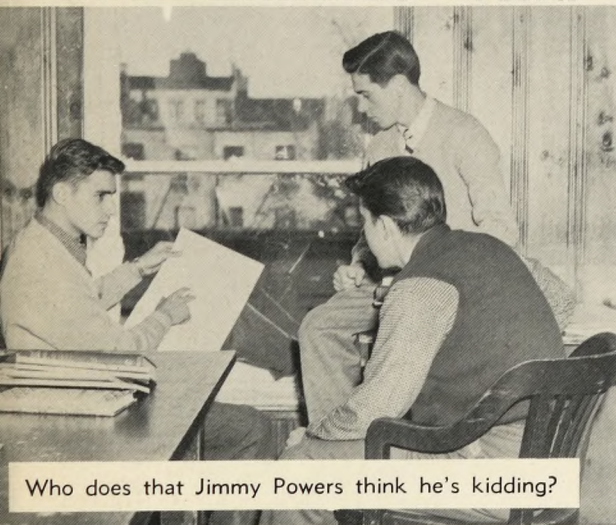
