In the outfield, Capt. Leo Walsh played a fine, steady game, always alert and coming through with the right play and hit when it counted most. Frank Ahern won the center field position over defensive player Herb Wood. Rightfielder Sam D'Agostino was a heavy hitter but a old shoulder injury hampered his throwing. Sam's extra base blows helped the team push across those runs.

Able Tony Costantino won the catching job and received support from promising Chris Mega. It was felt that if the three soph's in the infield could hold up, the team would be worthy of respect. The pitching was considered fair, the outfield with a veteran trio was set; if the infield could make the double-play and back up the pitching, then it was believed that the Terriers could field a balanced team.
